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

Welcome to Hershey and the National Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences!

We're delighted to host you here in Pennsylvania to *Nurture the Richness of Lifelong Learning* because we are very proud of our nationally leading teaching, research and Extension programs, including that we are making Extension advice and information available 24/7/365 on-line.

After having both been founded as state institutions in 1855, Penn State and Michigan State were the first federal land-grant colleges, established in1863 to apply scientific principles to farming. However, it was not until

the 1880s, under the leadership of President George W. Atherton, that the college expanded its curriculum to match the Land-Grant Act's broad mandate.

In 1911, Penn State requested money from the state legislature to fund a system of agricultural agents to distribute knowledge from the School of Agriculture to practicing farmers across the state. The Smith-Lever Act of 1914 provided \$10,000 annually to each state for agricultural and home economics extension, allowing for the expansion of the agricultural cooperative extension.

By 1921, Pennsylvania was one of only six states to have a centralized agricultural cooperative extension program. The extension service employed specialists in economics, forestry, soils, agronomy, family life, and many other subjects. Penn State has increasingly brought a wide range of science-based advice to both urban and rural areas.

Family and consumer science has been an especially valued aspect of our Extension efforts. Among other key programs, for example, research has demonstrated that our PROSPER program (**PRO**moting School-community-university Partnerships to Enhance Resilience) can reduce opioid misuse, and that these effects are sustained into the young adult years.

On a slightly later time-line than Penn State, Milton Hershey founded his first candy shop in 1873 in Philadelphia. In 1903, Hershey started a chocolate plant in his hometown of Derry Church, Pennsylvania, which later came to be known as Hershey. Long known as the "Sweetest Place on Earth", the Hershey Company has evolved to be one of the largest chocolate manufacturers in the world!

I'm confident that you'll find a lot of "sweets" during your visit, but even more confident that you will find much of lasting value in this conference. I trust that you'll enjoy your visit.

t really all began back in 1926 when Miss Florence Carvin attended the AHEA convention in Minneapolis, MN and was the only home demonstration agent present. In the next several years, more agents started attending, and in 1930 the first "house party" was held for extension workers. At the 2nd house party in 1931, Miss Grace Frysinger, the USDA Home Economist for the Central States asked Miss Clara Brian from Illinois to call a breakfast meeting and discuss organizing a national association. Miss Anna Searl, also from Illinois was appointed the temporary chairman. It took 2 additional meetings at AHEA before the new organization took hold in 1934 with the formation of a constitution, officers and committees. And from there...the rest is history.





Over the years the organization has grown and changed with the times, but the overall goals of those women who came together 85 years ago – to strengthen the work of the Extension Agent in the field, to promote fellowship among its members, to raise professional standards and to provide a centralized means for exchanging ideas and methods – are still alive today.

Financial Action Steps and Milestones for Different Ages and Stages of Life

Presenter: Barbara O'Neill, Ph.D., CFP, CRPC, AFC, CHC, CFEd, CFCS Room: Magnolia AB, Confection Hall Level

Generations vary in key ways- including personal finance practices- based on their formative experiences. Extension FCS educators teach clientele at different ages and stages of the financial life cycle and represent various generational cohorts themselves. This workshop will describe three financial life cycle stages (wealth protection, wealth accumulation, and wealth distribution), generational touchstones, and differences in financial management practices by generation, recommended financial action steps and milestones for people at different ages and stages of life, and useful financial education resources.

Similar to a medical standards of care (e.g., having a colonoscopy starting at age 50 and regular blood pressure and bone density tests), certain age-based milestones tell people the key actions to take at different ages. For example, the following financial activities often take place at various decades of a person's life:



- 20s and 30s Debt repayment and household formation
- 40s and 50s Peak earnings and wealth accumulation
- 60s Preparation for retirement and retirement
- 70s and Above Transitions and wealth distribution

Learning Objectives:

- Participants will understand characteristics of different generations, including financial management practices.
- Participants will participate in 10 learning activities that they can replicate with clients.
- Participants will learn about recommended action steps for different ages and age-based financial milestones.
- Participants will learn about resources to enhance their understanding of generational personal finance.





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
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
