1. Calling All Judges!

It's time to begin gathering **judges** for our national award program. We will need about 60 judges. We sincerely thank you for sharing your time and careful consideration of our applicants who work diligently assembling their applications. I will use the same system as last year: an online collector followed by random drawings of names for judges. You may or may not be randomly selected, but I thank you for making yourself available. Judging usually takes place in April.


Submit your proposal for our 2021 Annual Session now. The application is available on the 2021 Annual Session page under Professional Development on the website. Read through the FAQ Document for information. Review the webinar on "Submitting a 2021 NEAFCS Session Proposal" for a step-by-step guide with screen pictures. Tip: Always have another person read your proposal and comment according to the judging criteria. The judging criteria is listed on the FAQ document. The link to submit a proposal for the 2021 Annual Session will close on January 31st.



Sign up now to be a reviewer at the bottom of the 2021 Annual Session <u>webpage</u>. As a reviewer you decide what track/tracks you are willing to review. Most of the time you only need to review 5-7 proposals during the month of February. One way to learn about writing a good proposal is to be a reviewer, so *volunteer*. A webinar on how to review proposals will be presented on February 2 at 2 PM (Eastern).

Ritchie will be leading the preconference session *Values Driven Leadership: Working Towards a Vision for Common Good.* This workshop will help participants broaden their knowledge and understanding of the key leadership skills and values that can



empower self and others. Topics will include effective strategies for working across differences, identifying core values to create a greater sense of satisfaction, creating synergy between values, vision, and impact, improving interactions in conversations and dialogue with others, and increasing feelings of inspiration, drive, and enthusiasm.

Ritchie is currently the co-director of the Great Lakes Leadership Academy (GLLA) at Michigan State University Extension. Ritchie is a passionate leader and advocate for building thriving communities. He has led programs targeting neighborhood improvement and revitalization in the City of Detroit. His range of experience and competencies includes community and economic development; urban planning and land-use; community engagement; diversity, equity, and inclusion; and leadership development.

Prior to joining Michigan State University Extension, Ritchie was the community planner for the Detroit Riverfront Conservancy where he led extensive planning and development efforts targeting the Detroit Riverfront. His work demonstrates successful achievements of collaboration, diverse civic participation, and engagement.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion: Moving from Reflection to Action *Karim Martinez (NM), NEAFCS Diversity Subcommittee Member*

The new year is a time for reflection on the past and planning action for the future. 2020 brought us a global pandemic that exposed horrendous health inequities. The killing of George Floyd by police sparked a global movement to address racial inequities. In recognition of the importance of these and other social justice issues, Extension is increasingly engaged in conversations around topics such as Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI). The good news is that we in Extension CAN make a difference.



Through reflection and action, each of us can promote DEI efforts within our own spheres of influence. We can reflect on what each term means to us and identify strategies to promote them within our environments. For example, we can ensure diversity by reaching a variety of audiences. We can promote inclusion by not only ensuring diverse people are represented in our programs but also making sure they have a voice. Inclusion can be achieved by involving

clientele in the program development process by asking what information is relevant to them and how they prefer to receive information. And lastly, we can increase equity. Addressing issues of equity involves identifying disparities and then implementing practices or policies to create equal access to opportunities. Within Extension, equity can mean being intentional about increasing the number of diverse faculty and staff in our organization, as well as in leadership positions.

While these are just a few examples of how we can promote DEI efforts, it is important for each of us to first reflect and then think about what actions we can take to create a more just and equitable world. Remember, we CAN make a difference.

Kicking Off Awards Season: What should I be doing? Hope Wilson (AZ), Awards Training Subcommittee, Member

We've made it through 2020 and here's hoping 2021 is a better year. It's time to do all those things that we have put off until the first of the year. Add applying for an NEAFCS Award on that list of things. The national award submission deadline is March 15. That may seem like you have plenty of time, but there is a lot to do before that deadline. Here are some things to do now so that you can be successful this 2021 NEAFCS awards season.



- 1. Confirm you state affiliate award deadline and submission process. March 15 is the final date that your state affiliate has to submit your affiliate award winners to NEAFCS for regional and national consideration. However, each affiliate has its own process for award submissions and affiliate deadlines will be much earlier than March 15.
- 2. Review the 2021 Awards Manual/Guidelines.

 Even if you have been applying for awards for years, there are usually changes to this

- document every December. If you have never submitted an award application, this document is a valuable resource to understand eligibility requirements and judging. Do not skip the general eligibility requirements on page 6.
- 3. Identify the award(s) for which you plan to apply. You might start by scanning the 2021 Awards-at-a-glance to get some ideas https://neafcs.memberclicks.net/assets/awards/2021-awards/2021-NEAFCS-Awards-At-A-Glance.pdf. Then check the Awards Manual / Guidelines to see if you or your program meet the specific eligibility requirements for the award you are considering. Take a moment to consider awards that might not be the immediately obvious choice. Is there another award that might fit as well?
- 4. Look at application requirements for each award when developing your timeline for completing your applications. Some awards may require letters of support which will need to be requested soon so that you will have them by your affiliate deadline.
- 5. Spend some time reviewing the NEAFCS Awards page on the NEAFCS website. https://neafcs.memberclicks.net/awards
 There are many helpful resources, tips and videos to help you prepare for this awards season. You can see past award winners and award statistics. New resources are added frequently, so check back regularly.

NEAFCS Leadership Experience Taking Off

Leading. Learning. Mentoring. Growing. If you began this New Year with a desire to grow or to make an impact, we have the opportunity for you! The Mentoring & Leadership Subcommittee has been working feverishly developing the 2021 NEAFCS Leadership Experience and the wait is almost over!

The NEAFCS Leadership Experience is comprised of two components. First, a cohort of mentees will participate in four monthly interactive zoom sessions. In the first session, mentees will learn to lead themselves, developing trust in self, identifying strengths and communication styles. Next, mentees will learn to lead in their communities, discussing relationship-building, being vulnerable, and building teams. Mentees will also learn to lead as FCS professionals, focusing on collaborating, measuring impact and developing their brand. Finally, mentees will learn to lead within NEAFCS, learning the structure of NEAFCS, what leadership entails and how to dream bigger, taking steps that may be scary.

The second component of the NEAFCS Leadership Experience is the one-on-one mentoring. Mentors will work with their mentees to determine goals for their relationships and will share their own experiences, challenges and victories as mentor and mentee grow together. Mentors will participate in one of two mentor trainings in August, then the eight-month mentor/mentee portion begins in September. These relationships officially continue until April 2022; however, we hope they last a lifetime!
