A 7th grader hides in the bathroom and uses a paper towel as a makeshift toothbrush. A high schooler is teased for unpleasant body odor. An ER nurse treats another teen for infection related to prolonged use of menstrual products: the teen says "it was the only one I had, I wanted to make it last."

These are very real situations and experiences for youth, with 1 in 5 girls missing school due to lacking menstrual products (UM School of Public Health) and 34% of low-income families reporting challenges affording essentials like soap, deodorant, and toothpaste (Feeding America).

This annual session allows you to transform the lives of Arizona youth struggling to meet their hygiene needs. We are assembling hygiene kits tailored for young individuals

who may lack regular access to essential items like menstruation products, oral health care supplies, and body cleanliness tools. These kits are crucial and will be distributed to Extension offices, schools, and libraries. They will help prevent unsafe practices, such as using toilet paper or reusing products, promote health and well-being, ensure education is uninterrupted, reduce social anxieties, and boost teens' confidence in managing their hygiene. Make the Most of Your Education Experiences with these Presentation Tips

As health educators, you provide educational experiences that can be vital to the success of your community. We know this work can also be challenging, so the American Heart Association and Aramark aim to help make your workshops run as smoothly as possible.

<u>Sign up</u> to access a wealth of free Healthy for Life educator resources designed to promote better community health and make your life easier!

Read on for some best practices that will help you help others!

1. Be on the move

As you speak, walk around the room to engage your participants. Plant yourself in one spot for a bit, move, and plant yourself again. As participants speak, move toward them to show you're listening.

Be mindful of your stance, keeping feet shoulder-width apart, resting hands at your sides and gesturing when appropriate. You don't have to stand at the front of the room but make sure you don't turn your back on participants!

2. The eyes have it

Scan the room as you present, stopping to hold eye contact with individual participants for about three seconds. Maintain a pleasant expression to show your passion and interest and be sure to smile. Avoid looking down or over the group you're speaking to, and don't make any stern facial expressions.

3. Variety speaks volumes

Talk with conviction and enthusiasm! Throughout your presentation, use vocal variety. This can include changing volume, speed and tempo. Avoid filler words (like "um"), acronyms and filling every second with talking. Silence gives participants time to digest information.



4. Can you relate?

Share personal experiences, examples and analogies throughout your presentation to connect with participants. Use "we" language by including phrases like "When we cook with family and friends ..." When a participant shares with the group, use positive reinforcement and validate the person's answers. A simple "I agree" can go a long way. Take time to ask whether anyone has questions, and check for understanding frequently.

5. Expand attention spans

Keep your participants engaged by asking them to read slides or instructions to the group. You can also call on participants to answer questions or share their personal experiences. After asking the audience a question, repeat it and call on someone by name to answer. O, you can ask broadly "Does anyone at table seven have a thought?"

6. Watch the clock

It's important to start your event or presentation on time, even if there are only a few participants in the room. Keep your time milestones in mind and be sure to check the clock often. Help participants stay on track by giving time warnings during breaks and activities.

Inclusivity: How to be an Ally this Pride Month

An ally is an individual who stands up for and with marginalized groups (LGBTQIA+, people with disabilities, women, black and brown people) whether those groups are present or not. Some key points to being a good ally is:

- ✓ It is not the responsibility of the marginalized person(s) to educate you or others about issues or definitions.
- ✓ Allies create inclusive environments that give value and respect to everyone for their unique gifts, experiences, perspectives, and talents.
- ✓ ALLY is a verb, not just a noun. Being an ally means building trust with others through action and establishing mutual respect towards one another.
- ✓ Start with Yourself: Be aware of your social dynamics of power and privilege. How do you fit in?
- ✓ Ask clarifying questions and become an ACTIVE listener.
- ✓ **Explore outside your comfort zone.** Interact with different social and cultural groups.
- ✓ Become comfortable recognizing and discussing "isms" (racism, ableism, sexism, etc.) and "phobias" (transphobia, xenophobia, homophobia, etc.).
- ✓ Actions Matter, so listen harder to those from a different identity than you!
- ✓ Recognize when and where power and privilege can be used to support people with less power or privilege.
- ✓ Words Matter. If you're unsure of what is the correct term or word to use, just ask!
- ✓ Remember to speak up when you hear biased language being used against others.
- ✓ Always keep learning by accepting feedback or criticism, being aware of societal changes, and being ready to adapt to those changes.

With a plan in place before you arrive in Tucson, you will be more relaxed and able to enjoy the beautiful environment. **Take advantage of the morning ritual, service project, and other daily activities that fit your schedule.** In your program book, record key thoughts from concurrent sessions. **Network with NEAFCS members and share business cards, so you can reach out easily upon returning to your home.** You might also plan to write an action step or two that you will implement in 2024-2025 because of the strategies you gained. Travel away from annual session with plans to maximize your resources, strategies to challenge yourself to improve your work in our ever-changing world, and gratitude for the contributions you and all FCS professionals make and have made for 90 years to communities throughout our nation and world. **See you September 16-19 in Arizona!**
