Unlocking Potential: Innovative Strategies for Professional Growth Brittney Schori (IN) | Endowment Grant Recipient



Unlocking Potential: Innovative Strategies for Professional Growth was a professional development event designed to empower

Purdue University Extension professionals, both current and retired, in the area of Health and Human Sciences. Organized by the Indiana National Extension Association of Family and

This project received funding from the NEAFCS Endowment Fund through the Endowment Grant process.

Consumer Sciences (INEAFCS), this event celebrated 90 years of NEAFCS while highlighting the rich history of the Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) profession.

Held on November 6, 2024, at the Johnson County Purdue Extension office, the event brought together participants to explore the profession's history and inspire future growth. NEAFCS Historian Christine Kniep provided insights into the organization's legacy, while book discussions and networking fostered reflection and deeper connections.

Post-event data indicated significant impact: 98% of attendees said they learned information they would share with others, and 79% reported gaining knowledge to improve their lives. Before the event, 58% of attendees were unfamiliar with NEAFCS history; afterward, 69% indicated they had gained a greater understanding. Attendees shared that the event offered new perspectives on the HHS role, strengthened appreciation for the profession, and provided inspiration for future programming. By reflecting on the past and connecting with peers and retirees, participants felt empowered to reach new heights in their careers.


